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Crocheted Scarves and Hats

Artfully Simple Infinity Scarf

Use your imagination with this free crochet pattern. This Artfully Simple Infinity Scarf can be made with any size hook and yarn of your choice. All you need is one skein of your favorite yarn, and you're all set. The cute button embellishment is optional and easy to attach once you're finished crocheting directions are included. This crocheted scarf will measure between 50 and 60 inches when complete.

Materials:


- US K, 6.5mm hook
- US I, 5.5mm hook (optional, for making tie on button only)
- 280 yds worsted weight yarn (Red Heart Boutique Unforgettable in Tidal shown)
- Optional: Button (1 1/4" or 32mm button shown)

NOTE: This pattern is worked in a spiral, so there is no join at the end of the rounds.

How to keep it SIMPLE while making this scarf:

- 1. If the starting chain is twisting up on you, try to straighten it out for the first stitch, but don't worry about getting out every twist a couple twists are good! Keep going!
- 2. If you finish the first round and find out you've started with an "off" number of chains, pretend as if they're there, stick with the pattern and just keep going!
- 3. If you realize you skipped a stitch 2 rows ago, just keep going!
- 4. If you run out of yarn before you get through all the rows? Well then stop, because you're out of yarn, silly. Just skip to the end of the pattern and finish off as directed! Though you might want to pull out a row to make the tie at the end.

Here's a Chart to help you visualize how it comes together:



Instructions:

To start: Using K hook, ch 210.

Round 1: Work a sc in the first ch made, making the loop to work in the round. Dc in the next ch. *Ch 5, sk 5 ch, dc in the next 2 ch. Repeat from * until you have reached the end of the loop and there are approximately 5 chains left unworked.

Round 2: Ch 5, sk the remaining unworked starting chains and the sc from Round 1. Dc in the first dc from Round 1, then dc again in the ch 5 sp. *Ch 5, sk next dc, dc in the next dc and the ch 5 sp. Repeat from * until end of round.

Rounds 3 – 20: Continue working [ch 5, sk next dc, dc in the next dc and the ch 5 sp] in a continuous spiral. The pattern will seem to slant to the left as you work, as seen below. Stop when you count 20 rows of mesh, or when you're almost out of yarn. To finish off, ch 5, sk next dc, sc in the next dc, and use seamless join in the next ch. Weave in ends.

Instructions for the Button Tie Embellishment (optional):



- 1. Thread button on remaining yarn using a sewing or tapestry needle. Using I hook, ch for 18".
- 2. Slip the button down close to the hook, and skipping over the button, sl st in the 2nd ch from the hook (trapping the button in the loop). Sl st back along ch for approximately 6" or until this sl st section is long enough to fit around cowl when doubled, with a little bit of tension.
- 3. Ch 8 sts (for size button shown) or long enough to create a loop that fits tightly around the button. SI st in the same ch as last sI st, sI st in next 2 ch.
- 4. Ch to same length as remaining unworked ch, approximately 12". Break yarn and finish off ends.
- 5. To wear, slip button behind cowl and pull it toward the front. Pass button through loop made in Step 3. Let ends fly and jet off to the spa! Or wherever you want to look fabulous.



Sea Breeze Summer Slouch Hat

The refreshing colors of this Sea Breeze Summer Slouch Hat will instantly make you feel like you're relaxing on a beach somewhere on a hot summer day. Less than one skein of yarn is needed to complete this simple crochet hat pattern. In fact, it's such a simple crochet design that even a beginner could complete it. Variegated yarn makes it look a bit more complex than it really is. This trendy hat pattern is a great accessory for any woman's summer wardrobe.

Materials:

- Darn Good Yarn's Anamika Silk Yarn in Mermaid at the Sea (less than one skein)
- 4.0mm crochet hook
- Small needle to weave in ends

Abbreviations and Stitches used:

mc/r- magic circle/ring

st- stitch

sp-space

sl st-slip stitch

insert hook into stitch or space, yarn over and pull through stitch, (two loops on hook), pull loop

closest to hook through other loop

dc- double crochet

yarn over, insert hook into stitch or space, yarn over and pull through stitch (three loops on hook), yarn over, pull through first two loops on hook, yarn over and pull through last two loops dc2tog- half double crochet two together

insert hook in first st. Yarn over and pull through st (two loops on hook). Insert hook into 2nd st. Yarn over and pull through st (three loops on hook). Yarn over and pull through first two loops on hook, yarn over again and pull through last two loops on hook.

Notes:

You may find it hard to sl st into the top of the ch3 (image says ch2, sorry) to join each round, if this is the case then instead you can sl st into the space between the 1st and 2nd posts instead. Then you will sl st into the 2nd st as written in next line.



Instructions:

- 1. Mc/r with 12dc. SI st to join round <12>
- 2. Ch3. Skip 1st st. 2dc in next st and every st around. Last dc will be placed into the st previously left empty. SI st into the top of the ch3 to join round. See Notes <24>
- 3. Ch3. Skip 1st st. *2dc in next st. 1dc in next st. Repeat from * around. Last dc will be placed into the st previously left empty. SI st into the top of the ch3 to join round. <36>
- 4. Ch3. Skip 1st st. *2dc in next st. 1dc in each of the next 2 sts. Repeat from * around. Last dc will be placed into the st previously left empty. Sl st into the top of the ch3 to join round. <48> 5. Ch3. Skip 1st st. *2dc in next st. 1dc in each of the next 3 sts. Repeat from * around. Last dc will be placed into the st previously left empty. Sl st into the top of the ch3 to join round. <60> 6. Ch3. Skip 1st st. *2dc in next st. 1dc in each of the next 4 sts. Repeat from * around. Last dc will be placed into the st previously left empty. Sl st into the top of the ch3 to join round. <72> 7. Ch3. Skip 1st st. *2dc in next st. 1dc in each of the next 5 sts. Repeat from * around. Last dc will be placed into the st previously left empty. Sl st into the top of the ch3 to join round. <84> 8. Ch3. Skip 1st st. *2dc in next st. 1dc in each of the next 6 sts. Repeat from * around. Last dc will be placed into the st previously left empty. Sl st into the top of the ch3 to join round. <96> 9. Ch3. Skip 1st st. *2dc in next st. 1dc in each of the next 7 sts. Repeat from * around. Last dc will be placed into the st previously left empty. Sl st into the top of the ch3 to join round. <96> 9. Ch3. Skip 1st st. *2dc in next st. 1dc in each of the next 7 sts. Repeat from * around. Last dc will be placed into the st previously left empty. Sl st into the top of the ch3 to join round. <108>

- 10. Ch3. Skip 1st st. *2dc in next st. 1dc in each of the next 8 sts. Repeat from * around. Last dc will be placed into the st previously left empty. Sl st into the top of the ch3 to join round. <120> 12. Ch3. Skip 1st st. *2dc in next st. 1dc in each of the next 9 sts. Repeat from * around. Last dc will be placed into the st previously left empty. Sl st into the top of the ch3 to join round. <132> 13. Ch3 and 3dc in same st. Skip 3sts. 4dc in next st. Repeat around. Sl st into top of ch3 (see notes) to join round. <33 4dc clusters, or 132sts>
- 14. SI st into next st. SI st into the sp between the 2nd and 3rd posts (you will have two posts on either side of hook). Ch 3 and 3dc in same sp. 1dc in sp before the next cluster. 4dc in between the 2nd and 3rd posts of next cluster. Repeat all the way around. SI st into the top of the ch2 to join round. <33 4dc clusters and 33dc posts or 165sts>
- 15. SI st into next st. SI st into the sp between the 2nd and 3rd posts (you will have two posts on either side of hook). Ch 2 and 3dc in same sp. 1fpdc in dc in between cluster. 4dc in between the 2nd and 3rd posts of next cluster. Repeat all the way around. SI st into the top of the ch2 to join round. <33 4dc clusters and 33fpdc or 165 sts>
- 16. Repeat line 15, 14 more times (for a combined total of 16 cluster rows). <33 4dc clusters and 33fpdc or 165sts>
- 17. SI st in between the next set of posts. Ch3. 1dc in each of the next 2sts. dc2tog using the sp before the fpdc and the sp after the fpdc (insert hook in sp before the fpdc, yo and pull through space. Insert hook in the space after the fpdc, yo and pull through sp (three loops on hook). Yo and pull through first 2 loops on the hook, yo again and pull through last 2 loops on hook). * 1dc in each of the next 3sts. dc2tog using the sp before the fpdc and the sp after the fpdc. Repeat from * around. SI st into the top of the ch3 to join round <132>
- 18. SI st into the next st. Ch1. Dc2tog every st around. SI st into the top of the 1st dc2tog to join round <66>
- 19. SI st into the next st. ch3. 1dc in every st around. SI st into the top of the ch3 to join round. <66>
- 20. SI st into the next st. ch3. 1dc in every st around. SI st into the top of the ch3 to join round. <66>
- 21. Finish off and weave in ends

Prayer Hat

The Prayer Hat is a super simple crochet pattern that's even easy enough for beginners to work up. This basic crocheted cap was written for charity and was originally designed to be given to cancer patients. Whether you are looking for a simple crocheted cap for yourself or would like to crochet something for charity, this simple crochet hat pattern is great pattern to work up. It's quick and easy to complete, and it's stylish, too!

Materials:

- 1 ball of Red Heart With Love Yarn, Color: Bubble Gum (medium worsted weight category 4)
- 5.5mm Crochet Hook
- Craft Scissors
- Yarn Needle
- Stitch Marker
- 2 buttons

Head Circumference/Measurement:

Adult Ladies Size - 19 inches/48 cm - Please take note that the crochet chemo cap will stretch another 1-1.5 inches/3-4cms once placed on the head. For a larger size you can use a larger size crochet hook.

Stitches & Terms

This pattern is using U.S. stitches & terms. ch = chain dc = double crochet opp. = opposite sc = single crochet sl st = slip stitch st = stitch

rep = repeat

sts = stitches

rnd = round

unused loops = loops at bottom of foundation chain that appear after a row of stitches has been made on the foundation row

Instructions:

Notes: This pattern is worked in continuous rounds which means that there is no joining at the end of each round. Place a stitch marker into the 1st stitch made on each round.

Starting at the Crown (top of cap)

ch 4, join into 1st ch st with a sl st to form a ring.

Rnd 1: 8 sc into the center of the ring. (8 sts)

Rnd 2: 2 sc into each st around to the end. (16 sts)

Rnd 3: * 1 sc into next st, 2 sc into next st, rep from * around to the end. (24 sts)

- Rnd 4: * 1 sc into each of next 2 sts, 2 sc into next st, rep from * around to the end. (32 sts)
- Rnd 5: * 1 sc into each of next 3 sts, 2 sc into next st, rep from * around to the end. (40 sts)
- Rnd 6: * 1 sc into each of next 4 sts, 2 sc into next st, rep from * around to the end. (48 sts)
- Rnd 7: * 1 sc into each of next 5 sts, 2 sc into next st, rep from * around to the end. (56 sts)
- **Rnd 8:** * 1 sc into each of next 6 sts, 2 sc into next st, rep from * around to the end. (64 sts; you will now only be working with these 64 sts for the sides of the cap which means we won't be making anymore increases.)
- Rnd 9: 1 sc into each st around to the end.

Tighten the center yarn tail by weaving it in with a yarn needle.

Sides of Chemo Cap

Rnds 10 - 27: 1 sc into each st around to end.

Edging and Small Front Brim

Rnd 28: 1 sl st into each of next 23 sts, 1 sc into each of next 2 sts, 1 dc into each of next 14 sts, 1 sc into each of next 2 sts, 1 sl st into each of next 23 sts.

Finish off.

Weave in yarn tail with a yarn needle.

Front Wings (Make 2)

ch 19.

Rnd 1: 1 sc into 2nd ch from hk, 1 sc into each of next 16 ch sts, 3 sc into last ch st, working on opp. side of foundation chain; 1 sc into each of next 16 unused loops, 2 sc into last unused loop, join with a sl st into 1st sc. Finish off. Weave in yarn tail with a yarn needle.

Sew one end of band onto the inside of the cap and the other end of the band onto the front of the cap above brim with a button. Do the same with the other band on the other side of cap.

Lacy Spring Evening Scarf

Just because the weather is getting warmer, does not mean that you have to put all of your crocheted scarves in storage. This Lacy Spring Evening Scarf is the perfect crochet scarf pattern to make for those chilly spring evenings when you want something lightweight and warm. The open design of this scarf is timeless and classy and will look with any outfit. Plus, it's super easy to crochet and is made with less than one skein of yarn.

Materials:

- 6 mm hook
- About 1/3 1/2 skein of Patton's Lace Sequin Yarn in Aquamarine. You can make it longer and use more of course. I was surprised at how little yarn I used, because it is so lightweight and thin, it's a bit deceiving (in a good way!). This is one of my new favorite yarns:)

Notes/Abbreviations:

- This pattern uses the lattice stitch.
- Chain and stitch loosely for this look, using the larger hook with thin yarn like this keeps the scarf lightweight.
- Increase the foundation chain to the desired width if you crochet in a tighter fashion, just use an even number.
- ch = chain
- dc = double crochet
- st = stitch
- sk = skip
- * = indicated repeated part of pattern

Instructions:

Chain 18

Dc into 2nd st, ch 1, skip 1 st, *dc, ch 1, sk 1* <--lattice stitch, repeat across, then chain 2 and turn.

Dc in ch space, ch 1 across, ch 2, turn

Repeat to desired length, always dc-ing into the ch space

Optional fringe: I added a few pieces of fringe, kept it airy and lightweight for spring. Planning to make another in a new color and add beads!

Breath of Fresh Air Scarf

Crocheted scarves are not just for winter. This Breath of Fresh Air Scarf is the perfect accessory to wear this spring. The bright blue color is breathtaking and will add the perfect pop of color to any outfit. Plus, it's quick to crochet and only requires less than one skein of yarn. Free crochet patterns don't get much better than this.

Materials:

- K hook
- 1/2 skein Worsted weight yarn
- Scissors
- Yarn needle

Abbreviations:

ch-chain

sc-single crochet

sp-space

Instructions:

Ch 17

Row 1: Sc in 2nd ch from hook, *ch 2, skip 2 ch's, sc in 3rd ch*, repeat across. Turn

Row 2: ch 2, sc in first ch 2 sp, *ch 2 sc in next ch 2 sp* Repeat 3 more times. Ch 2, sc in the first ch from the previous row. Turn

Repeat row 2 until your scarf measures the length you want. I usually make my scarves approx 60 inches long. 60-70 inches seems to be about the average length.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

Greek Goddess Summer Scarf

Lightweight and dainty, this Greek Goddess Summer Scarf is a great crochet scarf pattern to make for the summer months. Use mercerized cotton yarn to complete this crochet design. It measures 52 inches long and 9 inches wide. It's easy to pack if you're headed off on a tropical vacation. It's a chic and stylish accessory that any woman would love to have in her closet. The elegant, drapey design will truly make you feel like a true Greek goddess.

Materials:

- Yarn: Classic Elite Yarns Provence (100% Mercerized Egyptian Cotton, 205 yards [186 meters] /100 grams): 2609 Parchment (discontinued) 2 skeins. If you cannot find Provence by CEY, a great substitute would be Spa by Caron Naturally, or another dkweight yarn. (I used 141 grams for my scarf.)
- Hook: P/10.00mm (large!)
- Tapestry needle

Gauge: 7 sts/4". An important note about gauge if you care: to adjust gauge, I would usually recommend going up or down a hook size. But because of the odd hook size (the next larger Q size hook is huge and I don't think an O size hook even *exists*), simply chain on more or less to your foundation row to achieve the same scarf dimensions given here; don't mess with adjusting gauge.

How to Crochet the Best Free Crochet Patterns of 2013

Instructions:

Foundation row: ch 101. Turn.

Row 1: starting in second ch from hook, sc across (100 sts). ch 2, turn.

Row 2: starting in third ch from hook, dc across, ch 1, turn.

Row 3: starting in second ch from hook, sc across, ch 3, turn.

Row 4: starting in fourth ch from hook, tc across, ch 1, turn.

Repeat rows 1-4 five times.

Sc last row.

Finishing: Break yarn and weave in ends with tapestry needle.

Crocheted Boots and Slippers

Crochet Rain Boots

"Rain, rain, go away, come again another day". If the rain doesn't want to stop then be ready for it with these Crochet Rain Boots. Beat those storms with a fabulous crochet rain boots pattern. These are size 6-12 months, but you can adjust to fit for an adult if you're an experienced crocheter.

Size: 6-12 months

Materials:

- Vanna's Choice® medium worsted weight yarn
- Crochet hook size H-8 (5.0 mm)
- Tapestry needle for weaving in ends

Abbreviations:

ch - chain

SC - Single Crochet

HDC - Half Double Crochet

SC Decrease – Single Crochet decrease

Please be sure to follow these tips on where I start, stop and join my rounds! Start your rounds in the same stitch as your chain.



Join your rounds to the first crochet stitch, NOT the chain.

Your last stitch should be in the stitch before your chain with the exception of round 3 where you will end in the stitch where your chain is. See picture below.



Instructions:

Chain 11, SC in 2nd chain from hook, SC in next 8, make 5 SC in the last chain Now working on opposite side, SC 9, join, ch 2.

Round 2: HDC, 2 HDC, HDC in next 6, 2 HDC in next 2, HDC in next 3, 2 HDC in next 2, HDC in next 6, 2 HDC, HDC in last, join, ch 1.

Round 3: SC 10, 2 SC in next 2, 2 HDC in next 6, 2 SC in next 2, SC in next 10, join, ch 1. (in this round only, your last sc will end in the same stitch as your ch 1).

Round 4-5: In back loops only, SC around, join, ch 1. (40 SC)

Round 6-7: Now working in both loops, SC around, join ch 1. (40 SC)

Round 8: SC 12, [SC decrease, SC in next 2] 4 times, SC 12, join, ch 1.

Round 9: SC 14, SC decrease, SC, SC decrease, SC, SC decrease, SC 14, join, ch 1.

Round 10: SC 10, 6 SC decreases, SC 11, join, ch 1.

Round 11: SC 10, 3 SC decreases, SC 11, join, ch 1.

Round 12: SC 8, 4 SC decreases, sc 8, join, ch 1.

Round 13-16: SC around, join, chain 1. (20 SC) (at the end of round 16, change color)

Round 17: SC around in new color, join, ch 1. (20 SC)

Round 18: SC 3, ch 8, skip 5 stitches, SC 5, ch 8, skip 5 stitches, SC 2, join, ch 1.

Round 19: SC 3, SC 10 in 5 chain space, SC 5, SC 10 in 5 chain space, SC 2, join to first SC, ch 1.

Round 20: SC around, join (30 SC)

fasten off and weave in loose ends.

Sixty Minute Slippers

These Sixty Minute Slippers are a quick pattern to work up in just an hour or less. Use bulky weight yarn to work up this free crochet pattern and keep your feet warm all winter long. Sizing instructions are available for two different sizes and two different widths. The magic circle is used to complete this free slipper crochet pattern.

Materials:

- US K, 6.5mm hook
- 150 yds Bulky weight yarn (Lion Brand Wool Ease Chunky in Mulberry shown)

Gauge: 6 rows x 10 sts = 4'' in dc

Sizing: Women's shoe size 6-8, and Women's shoe size 9-11. Average and Wide width available for both. Directions are given for Average(Wide) in the instructions, with instructions for shoe size (length) on Row 14. These slippers do have a lot of stretch, so you may wish to try them on as you go and before cutting your yarn to make sure they are the right size.

Special Stitches Used: magic circle, fptrc, fptrc2tog, seamless join.

RIGHT FOOT INSTRUCTIONS:

Round 1: Starting with the magic circle, ch 2 (does not count as a st) and dc 10 into the center of the ring. Pull closed, and join to first dc with a sl st. (10 dc)

Round 2: Ch 2, work 2 dc in each st around. Join to first dc with a sl st. (20 dc)

Round 3: Ch 2, [dc in next 9(3) sts, 2 dc in next st] 2(5) times. Join to first dc with a sl st. (22(25) dc)

Round 4: Ch 2, dc in the next 18(21) sts, fptrc (front post treble crochet) around stitch 20(23) of Round 3 (1 row down and 2 to the left). Dc in next st. Fptrc around same st as previous post st. Dc in last st. Join to first dc with a sl st. (22(25) dc) (see photos below)



Round 5: Ch 2, dc in the next 19(22) sts, fptrc2tog around first and second post stitches made in previous round. Dc in last 2 sts. Join to first dc with a sl st. (22(25) dc)



Round 6: Ch 2, dc in the next 18(21) sts. Fptrc around top of fptrc2tog from previous round. Dc in the next st. Fptrc around top of fptrc2tog again, then dc in the last st. Join to first dc with a sl st. (22(25) dc) (If possible, check for width after this row.)




Round 7 – 10: Repeat Rounds 5 – 6 twice.

Row 11 (Switching to rows): Ch 2, dc in the next 17(20) sts. Turn. (17(20) dc)

Row 12 – 14: Repeat Row 11. For Size 6-8, go to instructions for Row 16.

Row 15 (Size 9-11 ONLY): Repeat Row 11.



Row 16: Ch 1, sc in the first 9(10) sts. Fold the heel in half, right side together, and sc closed through both sides. (For Size 6-8, skip bottom sc to work even.) (8(10) sc)



Finishing Edging: Ch1, sc all around opening evenly. Use seamless join to finish off. Break yarn and weave in ends.

LEFT FOOT INSTRUCTIONS:

Round 1: Starting with the magic circle, ch 2 (does not count as a st) and dc 10 into the center of the ring. Pull closed, and join to first dc with a sl st. (10 dc)

Round 2: Ch 2, work 2 dc in each st around. Join to first dc with a sl st. (20 dc)

Round 3: Ch 2, [dc in next 9(3) sts, 2 dc in next st] 2(5) times. Join to first dc with a sl st. (22(25) dc)

Round 4: Ch 2, dc in the first st, fptrc around stitch 4 of Round 3 (1 row down and 2 to the left). Dc in next st. Fptrc around same st as previous post st. Dc in last 18(21) sts. Join to first dc with a sl st. (22(25) dc)

Round 5: Ch 2, dc in the next 2 sts, fptrc2tog around first and second post stitches made in previous round. Dc in last 19(22) sts. Join to first dc with a sl st. (22(25) dc)

Round 6: Ch 2, dc in the first st. Fptrc around top of fptrc2tog from previous round. Dc in the next st. Fptrc around top of fptrc2tog again, then dc in the last 18(21) sts. Join to first dc with a sl st. (22(25) dc)

Round 7 - 10: Repeat Rounds 5 - 6 twice. Turn to work in rows after Round 10.

Row 11 (Switching to rows): Ch 2, dc in the sl st and the next 16(19) sts. Turn. (17(20) dc)

Row 12: Ch 2, dc in the next 17(20) sts. Turn. (17(20) dc)

Row 13 – 14: Repeat Row 12. For Size 6-8, go to instructions for Row 16.

Row 15 (Size 9-11 ONLY): Repeat Row 12.

Row 16: Ch 1, sc in the first 9(10) sts. Fold the heel in half, right side together (wrong side out), and sc closed through both sides. (For Size 6-8, skip bottom sc to work even.) Weave in ends. (8(10) sc)

Finishing Edging: Ch1, sc all around opening evenly. Use seamless join to finish off. Break yarn and weave in ends.

Crocheted Blankets and Afghans

Lacy V-Stitch Baby Blanket

If you're in the market for a crochet baby blanket pattern, this Lacy V-Stitch Baby Blanket is perfect. Lime green sport weight yarn is used to complete this free pattern, which makes it ideal for both boys and girls. If you know how to crochet a blanket, this crochet pattern should not be any problem to complete. It looks like a large, lacy granny square and it measures approximately 32 inches in both length and width.

- TLC Baby Yarn-Lime Solid (2 skeins) and Laddie Print (2 skeins)
- Size K (6.5 mm) crochet hook

Note: Hold 2 strands together throughout



Beg-beginning

Ch- chain

dc- double crochet

rep-repeat

RS- right side

SI st-slip stitch

Sp-space

t-ch-turn chain

V (V-stitch)- dc, ch 1, dc

Instructions:


With Laddie Print, Ch 5.

Rnd 1- Dc in 5th ch from the hook (makes first V-stitch). *Ch 2, V, rep from * 2 more times in same ch. Ch 2. Join with sl st to 3rd ch from beg ch. Mark as RS.

Rnd 2- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. (dc, ch 2, V) in ch 2 sp. *Ch 1. (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. Corner made. Ch 1, rep from * 2 more times. Join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 3- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. *Ch 1. (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. Ch 1, V in ch 1 sp (between the V-stitches not on top of them), ch 1. Rep from * 2 more times. (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp, ch 1. Join with sl st in 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 4- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. *Ch 1. (V, ch 2, V) in ch 2 sp, (ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 2 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp, ch 1, V, ch 1. Join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch. Fasten off.



With Lime Solid, join with sl st to any ch 2 sp.

Rnd 5- Ch 4, dc, ch 2, V in same sp as join (makes first corner). (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 3 times. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next Ch 1) 3 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 6- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 3 times. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 4 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 7- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 5 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 4 times. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 8- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 4 times. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 6 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch. Fasten off.



With Laddie Print, join with sl st to any ch 2 sp.

Rnd 9- Ch 4, dc, ch 2, V in same sp as join (makes first corner). (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 7 times. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next Ch 1) 7 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 10- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 7 times. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 8 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 11- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 9 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 8 times. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 12- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 8 times. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 10 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 13- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 11 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 9 times. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 14- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 9 times. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 12 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 2 times. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

With Lime Solid, join with sl st to any ch 2 sp.

Rnd 15- Ch 4, dc, ch 2, V in same sp as join (makes first corner). (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 13 times. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next Ch 1) 13 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 16- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 13 times. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 14 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 17- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 15 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 14 times. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 18- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 14 times. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 16 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 19- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 17 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 15 times. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.



With Laddie Print, join with sl st to any ch 2 sp.

Rnd 20- Ch 4, dc, ch 2, V in same sp as join (makes first corner). (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 18 times. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next Ch 1) 18 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 21- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 18 times. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 19 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 22- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 20 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 19 times. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 23- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 19 times. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 21 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 24- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 22 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 20 times. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.



With Lime Solid, join with sl st to any ch 2 sp.

Rnd 25- Ch 4, dc, ch 2, V in same sp as join (makes first corner). (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 23 times. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next Ch 1) 23 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 26- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 23 times. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 24 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Rnd 27- Ch 4 (counts as dc, ch). Turn work. Dc in same ch 1 sp as join. *Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V) in next ch 2 sp. (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 25 times. Rep from * 2 more times. Ch 1, (V, ch 2, V). (Ch 1, V in next ch 1 sp) 24 times. Ch 1, join with sl st to 3rd ch of t-ch.

Finished Size: Approximately 32"x32" Square. You may continue to add rounds taking care to put corners into ch 2 spaces and V-stitches in ch 1 spaces.

One Ball Mini Throw

If you have one ball of extra yarn lying around your house (and who doesn't?!), then you can make this One Ball Mini Throw. It's a quick and easy crochet afghan pattern that you can make in just an evening using Red Heart Comfy Chunky yarn. Depending on the color yarn you select, this crocheted afghan can be made for a boy or a girl. It could even be made for a newborn baby if you are looking for a sentimental homemade gift idea for an upcoming baby shower.



One Ball Mini Throw

Materials:

- RED HEART® "Comfort® Chunky": Art N405, 1 360g ball solid colour
- Crochet Hook: 8.00 mm (US L-11)
- Yarn sewing needle.

Size: Throw measures approximately 30" x 30" (76cm x 76cm).

For Larger Afghan (39" X 45") purchase 2 balls of yarn and chain 108. Gauge/Tension:

Tension: 2 repeats = 9'' (23 cm); 6 rows = $5 \frac{1}{4}''$ (14 cm) in pattern. CHECK YOUR TENSION. Use any size hook to obtain the tension.

Special Abbreviation:

2trcl = * [yo] twice, draw up a loop in st, [yo and draw through 2 loops on hook] twice; rep from * once more; yo and draw through all 3 loops on hook.

Instructions:

Throw

Ch 82.

Row 1 (Wrong Side): Sc in 2nd ch from hook and in next 2 ch, * ch 3, skip next 3 ch, sc in next ch, ch 3, skip next 2 ch, sc in next ch, ch 3, skip next 3 ch, sc in next 3 ch; rep from * across; turn. Row 2 (Right Side): Ch 4, skip first sc, 3 tr in next sc, skip next ch-3 sp; (2trcl, ch 3, 2trcl, ch 3, 2trcl) all in next ch-3 sp - tr shell made; skip next ch-3 sp, * 5 tr in next sc, skip next ch-3 sp, tr shell in next ch-3 sp, skip next ch-3 sp; rep from * to last 3 sc; skip next sc, 3 tr in next sc, tr in last sc; turn.

Row 3: Ch 1, sc in next 3 tr, * skip next tr, [ch 3, sc in next ch-3 sp] twice, ch 3, skip next tr, sc in next 3 tr, rep from * across working last sc in top of ch-4; turn.

Rep Rows 2 and 3 14 more times, then rep Row 2 once more.

Last Row: Ch 1, sc in first 3 tr, * skip next tr, ch 3, sc in next ch-3 sp, ch 2, sc in next ch-3 sp, ch 3, skip next tr, sc in next 3 tr; rep from * across working last sc in top of ch-4; turn. Do not fasten off but work

Edging as follows:

Edging-Rnd 1: Ch 1, * (sc, ch 1, sc) all in first sc, sc in next 2 sc, ** 2 sc in ch-3 sp, sc in next sc, sc in ch-2 sp, sc in next sc, 2 sc in ch-3 sp ***, sc in next 3 sc; rep from ** to last 3 sc, end at ***; sc in next 2 sc, (sc, ch 1, sc) all in last sc; turn to work down side edge; **** work 3 sc over tr at edge, sc in st at end of next row; rep from **** to next corner st; turn to work across bottom edge; work in same manner across bottom and then next side edge; join with a sl st in first sc.

- Vanna's Choice yarn
- Size H crochet hook
- Tapestry Needle
- Poly-fil stuffing
- 2 small buttons for eyes

Abbreviations:

SC: Single Crochet

HDC: Half Double Crochet

DC: Double Crochet

Sl St: Slip Stitch Ch: Chain

St: Stitch

Instructions:

Head (make two):

Chain 9, HDC in 2nd chain from hook, HDC across, chain 1, turn

Row 2: 2 HDC, HDC in next 6, 2 HDC in last stitch, (10 HDC), chain 1, turn

Row 3-4: HDC across (10 HDC), chain 1, turn

Row 5: HDC decrease, HDC in next 6, HDC decrease, chain 1, turn

Row 6: HDC across (8 HDC), chain 1, turn

Row 7: 2 HDC in first st, HDC in next 6, 2 HDC in last, chain 1, turn

Row 8: 2 HDC in first st, HDC in next 8, 2 HDC in last, chain 1, turn

Row 9: 2 HDC in first st, HDC in next 10, 2 HDC in last, chain 1, turn

Row 10-11: HDC across (14 HDC), chain 1, turn

Row 12: HDC decrease, HDC in next 10, HDC decrease, chain 1, turn

Row 13: HDC across (12 HDC)

Row 14: HDC decrease, HDC in next 8, HDC decrease, chain 1, turn

Row 15: HDC across (10 hdc), continue to sc around, sl st to join, fasten off, weave in ends

Nose:

Chain 9, HDC in 2nd chain from hook, HDC across (8 HDC), chain 1, turn

Row 2: HDC across (8 HDC), chain 1, turn

Row 3: 2 HDC, HDC in next 6, 2 HDC in last, chain 1, turn

Row 4: HDC across (10 HDC), fasten off, weave in ends and sew onto one of the head pieces.

Eye Patch:

Magic Ring, 8 DC in magic ring, join to first DC, fasten off, weave in ends and sew on to head piece.

Sew on two small black buttons for the eyes.

Sew together head with face embellishments to solid color head. Leave a small opening to lightly stuff with poly-fil and then sew shut. Now sew on the ears.

Outside of Ears:

Chain 6, HDC in 2nd Chain from hook, HDC across, chain 1, turn (5 HDC)

Row 2-6: HDC across (5 HDC), chain 1, turn

Row 7: HDC decrease, HDC, HDC decrease, continue to SC around and when you get to the top, make two HDC decrease right before SI St to join, fasten off

Note: It helps to make 2 SC in each bottom corners.

Inside of Ear:

Chain 4, HDC in 2nd Ch from hook, HDC across (3 HDC), chain 1, turn

Row 2-5: HDC across (3 HDC), chain 1, turn

How to Crochet the Best Free Crochet Patterns of 2013

at the end of Row 5, continue to SC around and when you get to the top, make two HDC decrease right before SI St to join, fasten off

Note: It helps to make 2 SC in each bottom corners.

Sew the inside of the ear to the outside of the ear but be careful to sew only on the inside stitches so the yarn doesn't show through the outer ear.

Dog Paw Pattern (make 4): This would also make a great appliqué!

Magic Ring, Chain 1, 6 HDC in ring, join, chain 1

Round 2: 2 HDC in each around (12 HDC)

Round 3: Change color, *2 HDC, HDC, *around (18 HDC), chain 1

Round 4: *HDC and DC in same stitch, DC and HDC in next, slip stitch, *Repeat two more times, (be sure to end with a slip stitch) and continue around by making 2 SC in each stitch (18 SC), join with slip stitch to bottom of first ch 1,

Round 5: *2 DC in next 4, slip stitch to slip stitch, *Repeat two more times, fasten off.

Now make 4 more of these but without changing color (just solid)

Dog paw pads (make 12):

Magic Ring, Chain 1, 8 SC in magic ring, join to first SC, fasten off and sew onto dog paws

Now sew together dog paw with pads to solid dog paw like you did with the head. Be sure to leave a small opening to lightly stuff with poly-fil before you completely sew it shut.

The dog bone fleece I found is currently being sold as a "dog blanket" at Jo-Ann Fabrics for only \$2.50! I cut it into an 11x13 size piece and then crocheted around the edges.

To crochet around the edges you will first need a skip stitch blade to make holes around the edges. You will also need a 45mm rotary cutter handle. After you have crocheted around the edge of your blanket, sew head and paws onto the edging.

Relaxing Patterns

Free Crochet Rice Bag

Indulge in some quality rest and relaxation with this Free Crochet Rice Bag. Hot packs like this are always good to have around the house because you never know when you will need to soothe tired muscles. Work this free crochet pattern up using any color yarn you want. It's an easy pattern to complete using yarn, a little bit of rice, and a nylon stocking. Once you're done, simply place it in the microwave for about a minute to heat it up and voila! You've got yourself an instant homemade hot pack.



Free Crochet Rice Bag

Materials:

- Lily Sugar 'n Cream cotton yarn
- Size G crochet hook
- Rice
- Knee High Nylon

Instructions:

To begin: Chain 18, hdc in 3rd chain from hook, hdc across, (15)

Row 2 and on: Ch 2, turn, hdc across. (15)

Put Together: Once it is exactly twice as long as it's desired length (an even number of rows), without finishing off, fold in half with wrong sides together, ch1, and begin stitching both sides together with single crochet. (Be sure to sc the folded edge as well, to ensure continuity of style.) To turn corners, Sc 3 in each corner stitch. Before stitching all the way around, place Rice Pack inside, and continue to sc around remaining edges. Join w/ slip stitch to top of 1st sc.

For Border: ch1, sc in same sp, ch2, sc in next sp, *(sc in next sp, ch2, sc in next sp) from* around, working one (sc, ch2, sc) in the middle corner stitch for each corner.

Rice Pack: For the inside, fill a knee high nylon with rice, knot it, turn it inside out, and pull the rice bag through the nylon a second time. Sew the nylon opening shut, and place it inside the outer covering. You can also use an old thin small cotton sock in place of the nylon.

To heat: Place in microwave for about 1 to 1 1/2 minutes on high

Not Your Average Washcloth

This easy washcloth pattern to crochet is a little bit different from the other washcloth patterns you normally find. The thing that makes this particular pattern Not Your Average Washcloth is the fact that is has a small pocket in one of the corners. This added feature is the perfect place to store a small bar of soap in the shower or to hold onto the washcloth as you scrub those pots and pans in the kitchen sink.

- Hook: H (to make smaller or larger change your hook size)
- Cotton Yarn I used I love This Cotton by Hobby Lobby

Stitches:

chain (ch)
Slip Stitch (sl st)
Single Crochet (sc)
Double Crochet (dc)

Ch1 at the end of each row, is a turning ch, and does not count as a st.

Square Cloth:

- R: 1 Ch 19, 1 sc in the 2nd ch from the hook, * 1 sc in the next ch, 1 dc in the next ch, repeat from * across row, ch 1, turn.
- R: 2 * 1 dc in the 1st st, 1 sc in the next st (dc in the scs, sc in the dcs for pattern) repeat from * across row, ch1, turn.
- R: 3 * 1 sc in the 1st st, 1 dc in the next st, Repeat from * across row, ch1, turn.
- R: 4-20 Repeat R: 2 & 3, alternating rows.

Trim: sc evenly around all four sides of the cloth, stitching 3 scs each corner. do not tie off. At the last corner ch 15, join to the next st, forming a loop, tie off, weave in ends.

Corner Pocket:

- R: 1 Ch 3, 3 dc in the 2nd ch from the hook, ch 1 turn
- R: 2 1sc & 1 dc in the first st, 1 sc in the next st, 1dc & 1 sc in the last st, ch1, turn
- R: 3-1 dc & 1 sc, in the first st, 1 dc in the next st, 1 sc, in the next st, 1 dc in the next st, 1 sc & 1 dc in the last st, ch1, turn
- R: 4 Follow previous pattern of dc, sc across row, ch1, turn
- R:5-1dc&1 sc in the first st, dc, sc, dc across row, 1 sc & 1 dc in the last st, ch1, turn
- R:6-Repeat R:4
- R: 7-1 sc in each st across, 1 sc in the corner, sc across the next row, 2 sc in the corner, sc across row, 2 sc in the last corner, do not tie off

Line up the triangle to the opposite corner from the loop, sl st across the 2 sides of the triangle sewing the triangle to the washcloth, tie off, weave in ends.
